Re: Extension of Independent Living Program Eligibility to Age 23

PURPOSE

This Informational Memo explains an adjustment to Wisconsin's Independent Living (IL) program eligibility. Existing program eligibility for qualifying youth ends at age 21. However, since May 2021 regional IL providers have served youth to age 23 on a temporary basis using one-time federal stimulus funding. Effective immediately and on an ongoing basis with regular IL funding, contracted Transition Resource Agencies (TRAs) and tribal IL programs may serve IL-eligible youth up to age 23.

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BACKGROUND

The 2018 Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA) provides states the option to provide IL services to qualifying youth up to age 23. Since May 2021, contracted TRAs have been able to serve youth up to age 23 using funding provided under the Consolidated Appropriations Act Division X stimulus funding. In many cases, this was a continuation of services for young people who would ordinarily "age out" of IL services at age 21. With Division X stimulus funding ending on September 30, 2022, DCF needed to determine whether to continue eligibility to age 23 or revert to the previous age limit of 21.

INFORMATION

Based on positive feedback from service providers and young people – and to better align with the cadence of youth needs, maturation, and program engagement – DCF will continue age 23 as the upper IL eligibility age limit. This change is effective immediately.





The specific services and supports available to this population will vary based agency program structure and availability of funds. As with all IL services after a young person is discharged from care, youth engagement is voluntary, and service provision is guided by the young adult's wants, needs, resources, eligibility for other supportive services, and more.
